'Shameful' Qantas fined \$250k for standing down worker



A former Qantas health and safety representative says he has finally been vindicated after the airline was hit with a \$250,000 fine for standing him down for raising COVID-19 concerns.

The airline was found guilty of breaching workplace health and safety laws and agreed in late February to pay \$21,000 to Theo Seremetidis, who directed others not to clean planes arriving from China early in the COVID-19 pandemic.

Seremetidis was stood down by Qantas subsidiary Qantas Ground Services (QGS) in February 2020, hours after he told others to cease cleaning and servicing planes over concerns staff could be at risk of contracting the virus.

Speaking outside the NSW District Court on Wednesday, the former Qantas employee said he was happy with the conviction but the fine was "insignificant" for the airline.

"I'm glad that justice was served to Qantas today," he said.

"Qantas made a \$3.8 billion profit in the last 18 months, so what's a quarter of a million? That's a drop in the ocean."

Brittany Higgins and David Sharaz attend mediation in Perth over Senator Linda Reynolds defamation action



Brittany Higgins and her partner David Sharaz have attended a mediation hearing in Perth with Ms Higgins's former employer, Senator Linda Reynolds.

Senator Reynolds is suing the pair over alleged defamation in a series of social media posts.

In her first public appearance in Australia since the pair moved to France last year, Ms Higgins told the waiting media pack that Perth was a beautiful, but difficult place to come back to, and she believed "everyone's acting in good faith".

Senator Reynolds arrived shortly afterwards but said she would reserve her comments until after the mediation.

Tuesday's talks concluded just before 7pm, after almost nine hours of mediation, with Ms Higgins and Mr Sharaz leaving without making any comment. last year.

It's alleged Ms Higgins breached a non-disparagement clause in a settlement contract she entered in 2021, which prohibited her from speaking negatively about Ms Reynolds.

Ms Reynolds is seeking aggravated damages, an injunction preventing Ms Higgins from publishing defamatory material, and another injunction to stop her from breaching the settlement contract.

She has separately accused Ms Higgins's partner, David Sharaz, of defaming her in five social media posts, which were allegedly "falsely defamatory" and caused her "loss and damage".

The Perth-based senator first threatened legal action in July last year, claiming she had been the "target of unwarranted criticism and abuse" since Ms Higgins made her rape allegations public. Ms Higgins alleged she was raped by a colleague, Bruce Lehrmann, while she was working in Ms Reynolds's Canberra ministerial office. Mr Lehrmann's criminal trial was abandoned in October 2022 following juror misconduct and a planned retrial was later dropped by the prosecution. He has always denied the accusations.



International court referral has 'no credibility': PM



The prime minister has dismissed a referral to the International Criminal Court that accused members of federal parliament of supporting alleged war crimes in the Middle East. Anthony Albanese said the referral to the court, made by Sydney-based law firm Birchgrove Legal, did not have any credibility.

The referral said the government, including prime minister, Foreign Minister Penny Wong, Defence Minister Richard Marles and Opposition Leader Peter Dutton provided "explicit political, rhetorical, moral, military and material support" for alleged war crimes carried out by Israel.

Speaking to reporters in Melbourne at the ASEAN-Australia summit, Mr Albanese said there was no basis to the referral.

had put out alongside New Zealand and Canada in February, which urged for an immediate ceasefire in the region.

That statement also called for the release of hostages as well as further humanitarian assistance in Gaza.

"Australia joined a majority in the UN to call for an immediate ceasefire and to advocate for the release of hostages the delivery of humanitarian assistance and the upholding of international law and the protection of civilians," Mr Albanese said.

"If you go back to the resolution that was carried with the support of both major parties in October, they made it very clear that every innocent life matters, whether it's Israeli or Palestinian."

Morrison scoffs at concerns over his Liberal replacement



Former PM Scott Morrison has brushed off criticism about the Liberals' gender representation, after the party chose a successor for his Sydney seat.

Consultant Simon Kennedy, who easily won Liberal preselection for Morrison's safe seat of Cook on Monday night, has also defended his selection by hundreds of party members cast in the Sydney shire.

Kennedy beat Sutherland Shire Mayor Carmelo Pesce and war widow Gwen Cherne for preselection for the safe Liberal electorate.

Cherne, who was the only woman to nominate, had the backing of another former prime minister in John Howard.

"It was very humbling to be chosen by the group of 300 locals," Kennedy said on Tuesday. "I'm here to listen [to the community] and stand up to this Labor cost-of-living crisis, to hold the Labor government and Anthony Albanese to account.

Following the Coalition's 2022 election defeat, there had been calls for the Liberal Party to preselect more female candidates for winnable seats.

Kennedy said there was already 50-50 representation for southern Sydney seats, with Jenny Ware representing the Liberals in the neighbouring electorate of Hughes. three."

Morrison also scoffed at concerns about representation, saying the pre-selection process was carried through.

"These are decisions that party members make, and we respect those," he said.

"What matters is in a political party, the party members get to have their say, and they've had their say, and there was a very strong win for Simon."

But Victorian MP Keith Wolahan said his party needed more women, particularly in the House of Representatives.

Women account for only 30 per cent of the Coalition party room. Kennedy is a partner of consulting firm Banksia, after leaving McKinsey, according to his LinkedIn profile.

The 41-year-old contested Howard's former seat of Bennelong at the 2022 federal election but came up short against Labor's Jerome Laxale after an almost 8 per cent swing against the Liberals.

Cook is a safe Liberal seat, with the party holding it by a more than 12 per cent margin, with 55 per cent of the primary vote.

While Kennedy lives outside of the Cook electorate, he said he would move to the area with his family on Friday.

Alwyn and Swift dated for six years before the pop megastar met Travis Kelce.

Taylor Swift fans care as much about her love life as they do about her music.

Before the 34-year-old pop megastar started dating Kansas City Chiefs player Travis Kelce, she had been in a long-term relationship with English actor Joe Alwyn.

The pair dated from 2017 to 2023 — Swift's longest relationship to date.

It's not known exactly why the couple broke up, but many fans have speculated that the title for Swift's upcoming album, The Tortured Poets Society, refers to him.

As the hoopla around Swift and Kelce intensifies, some fans have started taking potshots at Alwyn, saying he let the singer "slip away".

But now, the actor has emerged from a long silence to post on Instagram for the first time since September 6 last year — a social media absence of more than four months.

Alwyn simply posted a carousel of recent photographs, with no caption and the comments function switched off.

The photographs included a picture of his dog, a black and white image of him smirking at the camera, the inside of a casino, waves crashing at a beach, and a panoramic shot of a racetrack.

But ultimately, the source added, the couple "weren't the right fit for one another."

Swifties, of course, went on to scour her album MIdnights, released late in 2022, for any lyrical signs of trouble in the relationship. When the album release was announced, Swift said it contained "the stories of 13 sleepless nights scattered throughout my life".

When her breakup with Alwyn was made public, fans went to town analysing the lyrics. "Joe and Taylor breaking up is less surprising when you realise that every song on Midnights sounds like it's from the perspective of a girl grieving the end of a relationship she's still in," one fan wrote, as cited by BuzzFeed.

"Most successful world tour of all time, Time Person of the Year, became a billionaire, broke a Grammy record and her new boyfriend, who could easily beat him up, won the Super Bowl. DAMN," one fan wrote.

"If you told me on this day that in 10 months she would be kissing her NFL player boyfriend on the field of the Super Bowl and hard launching him at the club, I would've actually started barking like a dog," said another.

With his silence-breaking new post, Alwyn seems to be hinting that he's happier living the quiet life out of the Swift-mania spotlight. On X (formerly Twitter), people noted the timing of his Instagram post as rumours build that Kelce is travelling to Sydney for Swift's upcoming concerts and showered her with expensive gifts for Valentine's Day. "I've seen more Joe Alwyn since the TTPD (The Tortured Poets Department) announcement than in his six years being with Taylor, and that says a lot I think," one X user wrote. "Y'all, did Joe Alwyn just send a 'bring it on, I'm not afraid' message to Taylor???" wondered another.



Melbourne Declaration'

The final statement said leaders "recognise the benefits of having the South China Sea as a sea of peace, stability, and prosperity" and "encourage(s) all countries to avoid any unilateral actions that endanger peace, security and stability in the region".

But they have watered-down language that Australia originally proposed for the final declaration from the summit, removing any references to China's "militarisation of disputed features" in the South China Sea.

The Melbourne Declaration also does not include Australia's initial proposal to call on "both parties" to abide by the 2016 international ruling, which dismissed China's claims to much of the disputed territory — a clear reference to Beijing's decision to ignore the decision. South-East Asian states closest to China have typically refused to back language that directly criticises Beijing on sensitive issues like the South China Sea. While Philippines President Ferdinand Marcos Jr has again criticised Beijing's conduct this week, Malaysian Prime Minister Anwar Ibrahim struck a very different tone, declaring that he didn't believe conflict was likely in the South China Sea.

Mr Albanese told journalists after the summit that Australia had to build a consensus with all ASEAN countries.

"People have to compromise," he said.

"To get a statement between Australia and ASEAN ... it wouldn't be the same if written by one country." Officials from Australia and South-East Asia were also engaged in sometimes difficult negotiations over what the final statement would say about the war in Gaza, with Malaysia and Indonesia pushing for a forceful denunciation of Israel. The final Melbourne Declaration calls for "an immediate and durable humanitarian ceasefire" and for "rapid, safe, unimpeded and sustained humanitarian access to all those in need". But stronger criticisms on Israel's conduct were not included. The declaration also includes an indirect condemnation of the Hamas terrorist attacks on October 7, and a call to release all hostages held by the group.

As South-East Asian leaders left the city, Mr Albanese hailed the summit as a success, saying the nations represented had welcomed Australia's plans to ramp up investment in the region.

With more signs of a famine looming, international pressure has only grown.

But Egyptian and Qatari mediators have struggled to seal a deal that would see Hamas free Israeli hostages in exchange for Palestinians held in Israeli jails.

Israel did not send a delegation to Cairo, saying it first wanted a list of the surviving hostages who could be released under the agreement.

Hamas said Israel did not accept its demands for displaced Palestinians to be able to return to their homes nor a complete withdrawal of Israeli forces from Gazan cities. More than 30,800 people have been killed in Gaza since then, the Hamas-run health ministry says. A Hamas statement said its delegation left Cairo on Thursday morning "for consultation with the leadership of the movement, with negotiations and efforts continuing".

Later, a Palestinian official familiar with the talks said: "The movement informed the brothers in Egypt and Qatar that it is open to negotiation to stop the aggression against our people." The delegation had "presented the minimum required by the Palestinians to stop the war, which is the return of the displaced, the withdrawal of Israeli forces, and allowing humanitarian aid and reconstruction", they added.

Egyptian state-affiliated TV channel al-Qahera cited a senior source as saying that the negotiations would resume next week.

Israeli government spokesman David Mencer told reporters that he could not comment on the status of the talks. But he said: "Needless to say, Israel will do whatever it takes to release our hostages. We've made very, very clear - and this has been reiterated by the US - that, unfortunately, it is Hamas who is the stumbling block right now by not telling us who is alive and who they have in their custody."

Super Tuesday: Trump...

President Joe Biden - who largely sailed through the Democratic nominating contests - said Mr Trump was "driven by grievance and grift".

The results make a repeat of the 2020 US election all but certain.

Both men appear poised to frame the election as an existential test for the future of the country as they head towards a rematch in November.

On Wednesday, Mr Trump made it clear on social media that he had now set his sights on that rematch, challenging Mr Biden to "Debates, ANYTIME, ANYWHERE, ANYPLACE!" on issues that are "so vital to America".

Polling indicates that many Americans do not want the same choice they had four years ago but the Super Tuesday results make a repeat of 2020 seemingly determined.

Despite the lack of enthusiasm, both men swept nearly all of the contests as voters in 15 states and one territory cast their ballots on the biggest night in the primary calendar.

Mr Trump won in Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia.

He lost in Vermont to former UN ambassador Ms Haley, who announced on Wednesday she is quitting the race without endorsing her rival.

Mr Biden swept the same states plus Utah and Vermont, but lost to a Baltimore businessman in the US territory of American Samoa. He also won the Iowa caucus, which announced its results on Tuesday.

His only challenger in the primaries, Dean Phillips, dropped out of the race on Wednesday and endorsed him.

As the two candidates racked up their wins on Super Tuesday, they characterised each other as threats to the US.

Mr Trump warned his supporters at Mar-a-Lago that if "we lose the election, we're not going to have a country left".

He invoked one of his key issues, immigration, and the numbers crossing the southern border. He also pledged that the world would see fewer wars if he were president.

Just before Mr Trump spoke, Mr Biden released a statement attacking his opponent.

"Tonight's results leave the American people with a clear choice," he said.

"Are we going to keep moving forward or will we allow Donald Trump to drag us backwards into the chaos, division, and darkness that defined his term in office?" Analysts are viewing the Super Tuesday primaries as a test of Mr Biden and Mr Trump's support in different states and among different groups. It is also a test for the parties and their voters' enthusiasm.

There were several other important takeaways on Tuesday night:

*In Minnesota, about 20% of Democratic voters cast their ballots for "uncommitted" as a protest over Mr Biden's Gaza policy

*North Carolina's closely watched gubernatorial race will be between Republican lieutenant governor *Mark Robinson and Josh Stein, the Democratic attorney general

*In California's US Senate race, Democratic Congressman Adam Schiff and Republican Steve Garvey, a *former baseball player, will advance to the general election

*Meanwhile in Texas, congressman Colin Allred - a former NFL football player - will take on Republican Ted Cruz in the Senate race

*By the end of Super Tuesday, Democrats and Republicans will have awarded about a third of the total delegate count available through the entire primary

The US ambassador to Israel meanwhile stressed that it was a mistake to think that the negotiations were over.

"There are still conversations going on. There's still back and forth. The differences are being narrowed," Jack Lew said

On Thursday the US and Jordanian militaries carried out another joint airdrop of 38,000 meals over northern Gaza, where the UN estimates that 300,000 people are facing catastrophic levels of hunger and children are dying of malnutrition and dehydration. However, the World Food Programme warned that airdrops were "not an option for averting famine" among so many people and urged Israel to allow it to use the Israeli port of Ashdod to deliver aid to the north.

The Trump campaign is confident the former president will hit the delegate threshold later this month.

Mr Biden and Mr Trump have all but locked up their parties' nominations but there were warning signs for both.

The president has seen some Democratic voters back "uncommitted" on ballots and while it is unclear how that may translate in November, it could chip away at his support in key states.

On the Republican side, many anti-Trump voters had given their backing to Ms Halev.

She did not hold a campaign event after failing to gain huge traction on Tuesday night, but her campaign emphasised that her Republican supporters - who could prove key in a general election - continue to seek an alternative to Mr Trump.

Sacked presenter Antoinette Lattouf, ABC to head to mediation in axed journalist's highprofile unfair dismissal claim



Lawyers for the ABC will go to mediation with representatives for a former presenter sacked after sharing a social media post about the war in Gaza following a major twist in the high-profile Fair Work claim.

Antoinette Lattouf, a former fill-in breakfast presenter at the national broadcaster, lodged an unfair dismissal claim against her former employer alleging she was dropped for her political views and because of her race.

During the first case management hearing on Monday, the Federal Court was told both parties were interested in heading to mediation as soon as possible.

This process is likely to take place within a month, following Justice Darryl Rangiah's orders for the proceeding to be referred for mediation after April 1.

Ms Lattouf was working as a fill-in radio host for the ABC's Sydney morning radio slot between December 18 and 22 last year.

She was dismissed on December 20 after sharing a post from Human Rights Watch on her Instagram page that alleged the Israeli government was using starvation as a weapon of war in Gaza.

The same claim was reported by the ABC that day. In her statement of claim, Ms Lattouf alleges she was sacked for expressing a political opinion and because of her race.

But the ABC has denied this, insisting a decision was made to "not require" her for the final two days of her five-day contract. The broadcaster has claimed Ms Lattouf "failed or refused to comply" with directions to not post on social media about controversial matters for the time she was presenting, resulting in her termination. Ms Lattouf is seeking a declaration that the ABC breached the Fair Work Act as well as compensation and a penalty for the broadcaster. During Monday's brief hearing Christopher Tran, acting for Ms Lattouf, sought an order for a "no later date" by which mediation with the ABC could occur. This was opposed by the ABC's barrister Ian Neil SC, who said it was antithetical to think the process would not proceed in an expeditious manner.

"It is antithetical to impose an arbitrary deadline," he told the court.

"The safer and better course is to leave the matter in the hands of the mediator."

The ABC is yet to file a defence to Ms Lattouf's claim that Justice Rangiah ordered be filed and served by March 22.

The matter was referred to mediation before a court registrar, following consultation by the parties, to occur after April 1.

In separate legal filings before the Federal Court, Ms Lattouf also alleges the ABC breached its own employee enterprise agreement when they sacked her "without a proper basis and due process."

She alleges the ABC breached the agreement by terminating her employment for alleged misconduct while failing to advise her what constituted the misconduct as well as whether the complaint was "substantiated".

Ms Lattouf is also claiming the broadcaster did not give her an opportunity to respond or explain her actions.

The court claims follow a bruising few months for the national broadcaster after staff voiced their outrage over perceived bias in the coverage of the ongoing conflict in the Gaza Strip.

More than 100 of the ABC's union-aligned staff passed a vote of no confidence in its managing director David Anderson late last year – both as a result of Ms Lattouf's dismissal and of the alleged "pro-Israel" coverage. ABC chair Ita Buttrose and the rest of the board have unanimously backed Mr Anderson. "It is abhorrent and incorrect that people would suggest that he has shown a lack of support for independent journalism and journalists," Ms Buttrose said in a statement. 
